Public Hearing on Septic System Problem

Two health-services issues were topics of separate committee meetings of the Montcalm County Board of Commissioners Tuesday morning in Stanton.

Economic Development and Physical Resources opened а discussion led by the Chairman John Johansen, regarding a proposed ordinance governing septic systems in the county. While the issue is regional, multiple counties had formed a committee, made of commissioners from each county, to study the reasons for elevated levels of E Coli bacteria in lakes and streams, most notably Flat River that runs through Greenville.

After five-years of study, the answers to; why is human waste showing up in water and what can be done about it? are about to be answered.

Marcus Cheatham, Director of the Mid-Michigan District Health Department told the committee that the problem appears to be septic systems that are never serviced following construction. "Before 1966 there were no regulations required. Now, we have a serious problem."

These permits will be good for 10-years and they are easy to comply with. His department is encouraging septic systems be pumped to alleviate the problem, particularly systems near lake and streams.

Cheatham told the committee that 10 to 15percent of the county's homes have failed systems or no system at all. With correction efforts, financing is called to question. "Financial Program Systems are available and the Department of Environmental Quality makes money available where an ordinance is in place." A one-year time frame is expected for the structure to be "super convenient" according to Cheatham. (continued on page 2)

Montcalm Youth Wellness

High School students from all over Montcalm County met at six Sunday evening in Stanton, over concerns that fellow students' involved with substance abuse need help. While the main topic was marihuana use, alcohol was on the list.

John Kroneck encouraged the Montcalm Youth Wellness Committee to voice radio ads to disclose the dangers of youth using pot, and recorded two commercials for airing next week on WGLM. Other publicity ideas were explored with a consensus to write a group letter to be sent to the

Lakeview Area News and other publications to warn against use of marihuana. One student who began the discussion asked, "What can we do to reduce or eliminate marihuana use?

Code of conduct implementation was one idea that would include team competition and signed pledges to avoid drugs, such as marihuana and alcohol. The pledge would include willingness to submit to evaluation and screening that could lead to counseling if they were observed high or drunk. Custom wristbands were suggested as ways of identifying team members (students) agreeing to the pledge.

Political involvement to strengthen their efforts resulted in agreement to attend a Candidates Forum at Montcalm Community College the evening of the 23rd, where they plan to ask questions about assistance to stop students from abusing substances harmful to their health.

It was reported that Narcan (naloxone) is available in area schools and at the ready in case it's needed to save an opioidoverdosed student. Smoking cessation instruction is also available. There is no antidote for marijuana.

The group letter will be released to media well before the November sixth vote."
