Firefighters Save House in Lakeview



Lakeview firefighters responded quickly to house fire and kept the damage to a back room

Long before trick or treaters took to the streets on Halloween, the quiet of downtown Lakeview was interrupted by the sirens of fire trucks responding to a house fire at 913 ½ S. Lincoln Avenue. Kevin Stockton, who lives across the street, was standing on his front porch when he noticed smoke billowing out of one half of the duplex around 11:30 a.m. He immediately called 9-1-1, which resulted in the firefighters arriving on the scene very quickly. Lake-

view Fire Chief Pat Carr said, "The key to success at a fire is early notification."

No one was at home in the apartment where the fire started, however, the other side of the duplex was occupied. Shirley Yanke noticed smoke coming into her side and vacated the building immediately. She moved her car across the street for safety reasons and stood there watching the firefighters.

building's owner, Ed Winter, was also among the spectators.

"I was only concerned for Shirley's safety," he said. Mike Basset and his girlfriend rented the apartment where the fire started. They were notified and came home after the fire was contained.

The chief said that the fire remains under investigation, but nothing appears to be suspicious. It took the firefighters one half hour to contain the fire. There was water and smoke damage as well as structural damage to Basset's unit and smoke in Yanke's apartment.

2018 Mid-Term **Election Results**

On Tuesday, November 6 voters went to the polls in large numbers to elect officials to federal, state and local positions. There were also several proposals on the ballots. The results for Montcalm County are presented here. Statistics are as of 10 p.m. with 22 of 52 precincts reporting.

For US Senate the vote was 57.97% for John James and 37.20% for Debbie Stabenow. In the 4th Congressional District the vote was 60.46% for John Moolenaar and 32.87% for Jerry Hilliard.

In the state of Michigan the vote for governor was 55.93% for Bill Schuette and 38.23% for Gretchen Whitmer. In the race for attorney general the vote was 58.47% for Tom Leonard and 30.31% for Dana Nessel. In the 33rd state senate race the vote was 63.65% for Rick Outman and 29.77% for Mark Bignell. In the 70th state house district the vote was 58.87% for James Lower and 34.83% for Kresta Train.

In the county commissioners races all those running were Republicans except in the 2nd and 5th districts. In the 2nd district the vote was 59.18% for Brendan Mahar and 34.10% for Mark Wilkin. In the 5th district the vote was 59.23% for Phil Kohn and 31.08% for Alan Andersen.

One of the local races that has been closely watched is the Edmore village council election. Gloria Burr received 233 votes or 54.44% for the position of village president. Aaron Hadley received 163 or 38.08%. The votes for village trustees were as follows: Joelle Betts 96-

Public Hearing on Human Waste



Full House at MCC

Human waste discovered in our streams, rivers and lakes in the Mid-Michigan Health Department's service area has become a serious problem, as explained by Aaron Snell of Streamside Ecological Services. His presentation was before a packed house of citizens at Montcalm Community College during the public hearing Monday evening at 6:00, requested by the county Board of Commissioners. The Board is considering an addition to existing regulations for septic systems in the threecounty region that must be approved by all three commissions before it can be in force.

Snell methodically demonstrated discoveries

of human feces in three areas tested, including Maple and Flat Rivers and Upper Pine. Tests of waters in the three-county, 1,300 square mile area that is Montcalm, Gratiot and Clinton counties, resulted in levels of e-coli so high that any human contact, even wading is dangerous.
