Yes, it is an auction of desired merchandise at the price determined by market demand. The system, as old as the bidding process, now comes to newspaper in a unique and fun way. Businesses are given an opportunity to feature merchandise or

services at the value you, the reader, believe they are worth and at prices you can afford, even in January, February and March.

**Opportunity Arrives for Hot**

Each week, in a special section of the Lakeview Area News, forms, called "Bid Sheets," will be printed for each participating business. The form will include a photo of the item(s) or service offered, plus a place for you to write your bid. You will be asked to initial the promise to buy the product if your bid wins. Cut out the form and take it to the business that week, if the item or service is to be sold that week by Thursday. The winning bid gets the item. The business person hands the top bid to the Lakeview Area News staff where your bid payment is made. With a special "paid" stamp on the form, applied at the Paper's office, take it back to the merchant to enjoy your new purchase.

Some larger items may mean bids will be open for a month or even

until the end of March. A merchant offering a large item, such as a car, can collect the winning bid each week and hold it for the end date, or final bidding process. Regardless, forms will be in each edition. And, if you want to submit more than one bid, get an extra copy of the Lakeview Area News for more forms. You can prebid by entering the date of your bid on the form for the date desired for bid submission.

Bid forms copied by a photo copier will not be processed or honored. Since you have time to inspect the product or service before bidding, there will be no refunds. If payment is made but the items are not picked up or services used by April 30 at 5:00 p.m., the item or service becomes property of the Lakeview Area News. If an item receives no bids, the item becomes property of the Lakeview Area News as well.

January 14th, public hearings are scheduled for the regular Lakeview Village Council meeting at the Airport Conference room. During Monday evening's meeting, the new council, led by Village President Dave Lund, the regular council plus sworn-in Councilmen Steve Chase and Greg Saxton, called for a vote on hearings on three subjects.

With the state-wide approval November 6<sup>th</sup> to legally smoke pot in Michigan, every township,

take action via an ordinance if they do not want marijuana businesses within their borders. To comply with the law, new Village Manager Warren Roth advised the council

to enact an ordinance before the state comes up with rules than could force permission to allow marijuana business locations.

During the discussion a question was raised by Trustee Bob Huttinga about "medical" marijuana and whether recreational and medical issues were under the same law. He was assured they were separate.

Roth advised that the village can "always come back and change an ordinance," if at some time they want to allow a pot business, but the option is closed if they do nothing. "An ordinance keeps us safe until we know what the state is going to do," Roth said.

Police Chief Dood brought information on results of Colorado's law, saying crime rates are up, as are traffic deaths from drug-impaired drivers.
