

Issues on voters' minds are the usual autoinsurance reform and the

gasoline. Outman said of the \$2-billion expected from the new tax, which would place Michigan as the highest gasoline taxed state in the nation, \$1.9billion would go to roads with the remainder to higher education. In the state-of-the-state address, Governor Gretchen Whitmer campaigned for free college education.

Other taxation issues included a proposed increase in business tax. The proposal is to tax on gross revenues rather than net. This increase would go to fund pensions to make up for lost revenue when the 12-year economic downturn hit Michigan. "Everybody did what they had to do to right the ship," Outman told the group. He cited cuts made in 2011 to be recovered now.

A licensed attorney, Andrew Doezema, has been appointed by Sheriff Mike Williams as the new Montcalm County Undersheriff. The announcement was made during committee meetings of the board of commissioners Monday afternoon in Stanton.

Doezema will oversee Law Enforcement, Corrections and Administrative divisions of the Sheriff's Office. Additionally, he will serve as interim Jail Administrator until the post is filled by Sheriff Williams.

Doezema has experience as road patrol sergeant, deputy and detective sergeant. His 18years experience is a strong qualifier for the

new position. Experience includes administration, advanced investigation, supervision training and patrol.

The new undersheriff is a former president of the Montcalm County Sheriff's Office chapter of the Command Officer's Association of Michigan. He is a forensic interviewer, speed measurement instructor and Field Training Officer.

Andrew holds a Juris Doctorate degree, magna cum laude, from Western Michigan University, Thomas M. Cooley Law School and a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice from Calvin College. He enjoys traveling with his family, running, water and snow sports and tinkering in his shop.
