Students became entrepreneurs by creating marketable products to sell thus providing them money to shop. Chamber Lane was a big hit at Lincoln Heights Elementary, Greenville where Sue teaches. Outside of the classroom, Sue and a friend had fun selling refurbished furniture and unique items until the store closed and they no longer had an avenue for their creative

items. While dining at Eureka's Kitchen, Sue was offered a small space connected to the restaurant to open her own shop. The classroom name Chamber Lane was an obvious choice for her eclectic collection of items to sell. Sue also had a family member that offered her an abundance of items for resale as they were downsizing along with children moving away from home and heading for college life on their own. So, Chamber Lane Resale Shoppe began connected to Eureka's Kitchen until recently when a larger shop became available. Chamber Lane has moved into the previous location of Vicki's Flowers, which is behind Karrie's Hair Care Salon. Chamber Lane is easy to find, just look for the life size toy soldiers on

Main Street of Blanchard near King's Trading Post and follow the lane (sidewalk beside the building) to the store. Current hours for the resale shop are Thursday through Saturday, 11 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Sue shared that they have new inventory arriving every week which included, holiday items, household goods, furniture, fishing lures & tackle, beautiful pictures and paintings, candles, wreaths and much, much more. She also suggested with a smile, that if you are looking for something in particular, they might have it in their "warehouse"!

Blanchard has always been a shopper's delight, and we are happy to welcome another special little shop to our already special little town!



Holocaust Survivor, Irene Butter will talk at Tamarack District Library on Saturday, Oct. 2 at 3 p.m.

Irene Hasenberg Butter is a well-known peace activist, Holocaust survivor, and Professor Emerita of Public Health at the University of Michigan. She is a frequent and favored inspirational speaker, talking about her experience during World War II and stressing the importance of "never a bystander" and that "one person can make a difference." Irene is co-founder

of Zeitouna, an organization of Jewish and Arab women working for peace, and a founder of the Raoul Wallenberg Project at the University of Michigan, which honors the Swedish diplomat who saved thousands of Jews with fellowships and an annual award for peace workers such as the Dalai Lama, Elie Wiesel, Desmond Tutu. She received a PhD in Economics from Duke

University.
