Recycling Bins - A Thing of the Past?



Soon to be replaced by compactors

At last Tuesday's Lakeview Village Council meeting, members voted to collaborate with the county to become a test facility for the latest in recycling operations. Currently, recycling is handled in Lakeview at the North Street DPW facility with the usual big green recycling bins.

Starting around the first of December, the North Street facility will be closed for recycling and the operation will be moved to the back parking lot of the new Municipal Complex, 208 S. Lincoln Avenue, with one big difference - compactors.

Recycling compactors will take the place of the old bins, which will eliminate overflowing of recycling materials and will have twice the capacity of traditional bins. The compactors will be coming from Allied Waste and when the compactors are about 90% full, they will send a message to Allied that they need to be emptied. Someone from the company will come and empty them.

The village is responsible for installing a cement pad for the compactors and for electrical service.

Because Montcalm has a trash dump, the county gives money back to communities for recycling. Also, we sell plastic and cardboard, which helps to offset the cost.

When the compactors are installed and operational, we will do a follow up story. In the meantime, be proud that our little village is leading the way in this next big step in recycling.;

114-Year-Old Flag Returns Home

It was the early 1960's and Lakeview Village Clerk Dallas Lincoln was preparing for the evening's village council meeting. He was in the old town hall, where the Lakeview Community Center now sits. Part of his duties were to open the room where the council meeting was to take place, set up chairs and get everything ready for the meeting. On this one particular night, while performing those duties, he found an American flag that was just sort of tossed in the corner. Someone had used it to wipe off tables. Surprisingly the old flag was not torn or tattered, just faded.

He thought that was disrespectful so he decided to rescue the flag

and take it home with him. Later that night, he

counted the stars. To his surprise, there were only 46 stars! The 46th state to enter the union was Oklahoma in November 16, 1907. That would have made the flag 53 years old in 1960. Dallas has kept the flag for over 60 years. That Old Glory is now 114 years old!

Dallas recently presented the old flag to Lakeview Village Manager, Darin Dood, to display it in the village's new Municipal Building so it can be shared with the community.

"I think of it as returning it to its original owner," Dallas said, "because it came from the old village council chambers."

REPORTS

Lieutenant Russell stated the numbers are down. These are down due to the loss of our afternoon patrol officer. When asked if the village is doing well as a whole, Manager Dood stated we are doing really well. The State Police have been coming in and helping knowing the department isn't fully staffed.

Supervisor Bucholtz's added that there are still handicap parking spaces to paint yet. When asked if we schedule days to pick up the leaves, he stated we watch for piles and decent weather.

OIC Smith added that September is a busy month for the water department. As far as sewer,

through the end of the year. We took in 21 samples for water testing.

Manager Dood said that the gas station on M-46 has decided to hold off on their opening. Some of the equipment they need is not available yet and therefore creates problems with some of the permitting process. It is in their best interest to wait on the opening. The process of obtaining a liquor license was discussed.

Manager Dood talked about his experience going to the top of the water tower. He expressed he was impressed with how the DPW handled safety measures, and the knowledge they have to run sophisticated equipment. He encourages the council members to get involved with day-to-day activity in the village so when decisions need to be made, they have the knowledge they need to make them.
