Happy Thanksgiving


The Lakeview Area News office will be closed Thursday, November 25 and Friday, November 26 so we can enjoy the holiday with our families.

Community Thanksgiving - 400 Years and Counting

For 400 years Americans have been celebrating Thanksgiving. It may have been to recognize a successful corn harvest, which is what the pilgrims were doing in 1621 – or it may be neighbors gathering to remember why we're grateful to God which is what the Lakeview community was doing last Sunday night. Americans have a history of honoring God with our gratitude.

It was Governor William Bradford who organized the first pilgrim feast in 1621. The festival lasted three days. A year earlier, in September 1620, the small ship called the Mayflower, had left Plymouth, England with 102 passengers. Some were religious separatists seeking a new home where they could freely practice their faith. Others in the group were enticed by the promise of prosperity and land ownership in the 'New World.' Their treacherous

voyage lasted 66 days. They landed at Cape Cod, Massachusetts, which was far north of their intended destination at the mouth of the Hudson River. A month later, Mayflower crossed Massachusetts Bay, where the pilgrims began working to build a village at Plymouth. The following fall they had their first Thanksgiving meal which featured lobster and seal on the menu as well as turkey.
