Shoebox Collection Week Unhindered by Snowfall

Four shoeboxes filled with gifts for children somewhere in the world sat on my coffee table while snow piled up on my deck and driveway. My youngest three grandchildren and I had begun our shopping in early October, quickly dispatching the list of basic items: toothbrushes, combs, soap, washcloths, school supplies, and small toys. Even five-year-old Ella, who shopped in person for the first time last year, knows the routine. A final trip for a larger "Wow" gift a few days before had filled their boxes, and one that I fill each year in honor of a friend was ready to go. Most of them included summer shoes purchased at half the clearance price, bargains I celebrate when I

think of the hazards small feet can encounter in impoverished areas of the world. Collection Week for Operation Christmas Child. a Samaritan's Purse outreach, was running out as I stayed off hazardous roads. On Monday, November 21, the last day to deliver the boxes, I finally made it to St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Big Rapids, the nearest collection center.

It appeared that most donors had come bearing their gifts despite the weather, because I found the long hallway of the church already stacked twodeep with the square Samaritan's Purse boxes that hold fourteen or fifteen boxes each, depending upon size. Sturdy red and green cardboard boxes as well as plastic shoeboxes are available from Samaritan's Purse, but many of us use empty shoeboxes from retailers or our closets, which can vary in size. Kathy Bailey was overseeing a crew of women who were receiving, recording, and packing the boxes as they were brought in, sometimes by the church vanload, often by twos and threes from families. Susan Truog, who chaired the project for many years, had turned over the task to able hands! At the end of the day, the boxes would be taken by truck to Mount Pleasant Community Church, another collection center that also hosts the next step in processing, and loaded into semis bound for Samaritan's Purse headquarters in Boone, North Carolina. When Collection

Week closed that Monday afternoon, a record number of 1,515 boxes had been received at St. Peter's!

Filling shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child is one of my favorite annual rituals. It helps our own children focus outside themselves to provide some basic items and a bit of fun to children who, in many cases, have never received a gift of their own. (A testimony I read a few years ago from a girl who had grown up in an orphanage told how she had especially appreciated receiving her own toothbrush, after formerly having to share. Are you cringing, moms?) The boxes are shipped to countries around the world, sometimes completing their journeys on the backs of donkeys or by canoe down remote rivers. Children on the often-overlooked Pacific Islands have received boxes in recent years. This year, many will be distributed to children displaced by the war in Ukraine. However, as welcome as the gifts themselves may be, Operation Christmas Child is not a mere distribution of "stuff", but a strategic way to introduce children and their families

to the Good News that Jesus came as God's greatest Gift to die for them. Each recipient hears a basic Gospel presentation and has the option of attending a follow-up Bible course called The Greatest Journey led by a trained local worker. In addition to the suggested shipping donation of \$10.00 per box, donors may support The Greatest Journey for \$6.00 per child. In some instances, new Christian churches have been formed in communities that formerly lacked them as a result of Operation Christmas

Why not start planning ahead for Operation Christmas Child next year? Save the boxes from your shoe purchases or collect them from family and friends and set aside a plastic bin for hygiene and school supplies and other items you find on sale through the year. Plan a shopping trip with children. Invite friends to a packing party and enjoy snacks and conversation while filling boxes. You never know how far your gift may go!
