# **Vestaburg Celebrates 150 Years** with Community Days

Among the many festivals that add excitement to summer weekends, those that celebrate major milestones of local history are rare. This past weekend, tiny Vestaburg on the eastern edge of Montcalm County had the distinction of celebrating 150 years with a very special Community Days festival. The many and varied events listed in the festival brochure begged for a closer look. When one considers all the planning and effort necessary to offer a weekend of family fun to the public—the many who contribute time, money, and effort in small and larger ways, and the few who work nonstop for weeks to bring everything together-their efforts de-

serve recognition. Moreover, the diligent organiz-Vestaburg of Community Days gave the public a truly memorable celebration of Vestaburg Sesquicentennial. My visit on Saturday afternoon, enjoyable though it was, could barely scratch the surface.

Beginning at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, a Quilt Show in the Vestaburg Elementary Media Center extended through Saturday. Friday's lineup also offered a horseshoe contest, a free SHOUT Beatles Tribute in the VHS Gym, and 5K Glow Run/Walk on the track at dusk—truly something for every age and in-

Saturday's festivities began with a pancake breakfast in the Church of

Christ Fellowship Hall for a \$5.00 donation to Vestaburg Community Days. Sand Volleyball players or fans could then proceed to the Practice Football Field for a tournament or the Ken Bigelow Bicycle Ride Alzheimer's Disease starting from the High School Football Field parking lot. Two Old-Fashioned Baseball Games would pair the Rockford Rogues against the Portland Blue Sox on the high school athletic field. Military activities for kids were held south of Peasley's Home Center, an anchor business in downtown Vestaburg for generations. Also located there were food trucks, a dunk tank, inflatables games, and face painting.

I arrived in town just

as the parade was ending and the Richland Township Fire Department was serving a Firemen's Dinner of a pulled pork sandwich or hot dog with sides. There was a charge for lunch, but the Fire Hall would also be the scene of a free picnic meal at suppertime. As I walked through town, much friendly rivalry was evident at the bean bag (corn hole) tournament. Horse-drawn wagon rides carried guests around town to the leisurely clip-clop rhythm of yesteryear. I made my way to the Vestaburg Community Schools complex hoping to see the art show. Sadly, the artists had already left. Several craft booths lined the perimeter of the school commons: beautiful, prac-

laminated wood with butter-smooth finishes; wooden toys; original jewelry designs in wire and beads; and more.

A quilt show filled the Media Center aisles with color. A sampler of intricately pieced blocks unified in rosy tints and a small wall quilt in browns and grays mimicking machine gears presented a study in contrasts. Classic squares arranged on the diagonal adorned a large bed quilt; nearby, a crib-size quilt featured embroidered figures of little girls in gardens and little boys with fishing poles. One of my favorites was a Pennsylvania-Dutch inspired appliqued quilt rendered in batik cotton fabrics, surely the product of many hours of work!
