Welcome to the new location of Fabulous Finds, housed between Peddler's Patch and Cantwell Bros. Hardware. John and Gretchen VerPlank opened the original Fabulous Finds in 2020 in a 2000-squarefoot building on the east side of Lincoln Avenue in downtown Lakeview. The new building, which they

purchased in December 2021, is approximately 3200 square feet, allowing them to spread out their displays and bring in more inventory, some of which had been in storage.

Why purchase the new building? John Ver-Plank said that he loved the architecture of the building, but it had been architecturally altered and he wanted to bring it back to its historic look.

"When I removed the mansard that had been added to the outside, I found amazing windows," VerPlank said. "The mansard was not the right style for the building and the windows were super cool."

He was able to purchase the building in a foreclosure package that not only included the building, but a house and a duplex as well. All structures

were in need of massive repairs and remodeling. He remodeled the house and sold it, but kept the duplex.

The most needy building was the store itself. The previous owners ran a used flea market-type store and when they vacated the building, they didn't get rid of anything. The place was full of trash and junk.

> Upon our arrival at the Community Center, we were provided with auction numbers. Those who wished to purchase tickets for a fifty-fifty raffle were invited to do so. Most guests had purchased dinner tickets in advance.

Donated items for the silent auction were displayed in zones, with no minimum bids required. Christmas porch decorations, handmade quilts, baby gift packs, specialty food baskets, gift certificates, and many other items appealed to a wide range of tastes. A number of handmade Rustic Twig Furniture pieces made by K.J. Lehman near Gowen were included; according to the information tag on one item, Mr. Lehman donates most of his handmade pieces to local fundraisers and charities.

An elevated area of the center held an interesting historical display, with photos of the leased farmhouse in which the hospital was first established in 1944 by osteopathic physicians LeRoy E. Jagnow and H.R. Seelye, and later buildings and innovations up to the current facility, which opened on April 30, 1956. Though an administration building has since been added and substantial modifications have been made to the emergency department and other areas, the narrow doorways and other outdated features have become a hindrance to up-to-date care and convenience. Alongside the photos of buildings and memorabilia, the faces of doctors, nurses, and other patient care providers looked out from the past with dedication and determination as if to say, "Build on our legacy! Don't quit!"

After perusing the historical display and placing a few silent auction bids, we found seats at one
