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## Honor Flight Dream Fulfilled for Paris Area Guardsman

Some heroes wear uniforms. Others quietly step up to help them receive the recognition they deserve. On Wednesday, March 19, this writer was privileged to meet both kinds. Last fall, we brought you a story about James "Jim" Johnson, a Paris area man who served 26 1/2 years in the National Guard, earning the rank of Staff Sergeant E-6 while deployed to Panama in 1995 and also serving in Atlanta, Georgia during the 1996 Olympic Games. When the Honor Flight program, originally begun to honor veterans of World War II, was expanded to include those who had served in our military through the Vietnam era as well as National Guardsmen, Jim's 1974 enlistment qualified him to participate. His flight was already scheduled when his appointed Guardian (a traveling companion required for the program, since original participants were in advanced years) decided not to participate. Then the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 brought the entire program to a halt. Jim's opportunity appeared to have been lost forever.

As the pandemic eased and Honor Flights began again, Jim's neighbors Charles ("Chuck")

and Brenda Hall began to discuss the possibility of Chuck serving as Jim's Guardian so that he could be reinstated in the program. After all, Jim is known as the kind of neighbor who is always ready to help someone else. Chuck would participate at his own expense, though all expenses are covered for honorees. At first, they were told that Jim's name would be at the bottom of the list. However, an administrator who was made aware of the earlier cancellation moved him back to the top. After completing paperwork that included a doctor's report, Jim and Chuck were soon scheduled for an Honor Flight in October, 2024.

Very early on the morning of October 15, after a drive from Paris to Traverse City, the two boarded a chartered flight at Cherry Capital Airport to begin their unforgettable adventure in Washington, D.C. Most of their fellow honorees were Vietnam veterans, though one WWII veteran was among them.

Local Soldier Wins Citation for Aid to Vietnamese

Michael Corporal John Maxfield of Lakeview, who recently completed his tour of duty with the Marine Corp. and returned here following his

discharge, was given a ci-J. Hyland, Admiral U.S. Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet and reads as follows:

For heroism while serving in Company D. Ninth Engineer Battalion, First Marine Division in

the Republic of Vietnam. On 30 September 1968, Corporal Maxfield's unit was repairing a section of National Route One when a Vietnamese bus that was proceeding along the roadway detonated a large enemy mine and immediately burst into flames. Disregarding his own safety, Corporal Maxfield unhesitating rushed to the scene to assist the injured passengers who were trapped inside the burning vehicle. Ignoring the intense heat, he repeatedly entered the vehicle and carried the Vietnamese civilians to safety. When all the passengers had been removed, he commenced to administer first aid and remained with the injured people until they were

evacuated to a secure area.
