The land lies silent. Not much is happening between 18 and 19-Mile Roads north of Big Rapids.

And that's just the way the Green Township residents like it. Those who have followed the ongoing actions between Gotion, Inc. and Green Township residents since early 2023, know most of the details: all of the initial secrecy surrounding the project, the backdoor deals between Gotion and certain board members that residents knew nothing about, the

monthly township meetings that soon overflowed with 300-400 concerned citizens trying to get at the truth, the rallies, the protests and the hundreds of yard signs that can still be seen peppering Mecosta County. And then they got busy. The citizens of Green Township organized door-to-door recall petitioning and got the word out in local and social

steps necessary that eventually led to the entire township board being recalled, with the exception of those who resigned. This was followed by a newly elected board that listened to residents and said no to Gotion with legal action. Concerned citizens also formed the Mecosta Environmental and Security Alliance (MESA), a non-profit that researches and presents the facts on why national security and environmental issues are the main reasons to stop Gotion.

Now, two years after the residents began speaking out against a factory they never wanted — and were never told about things have changed. Perhaps the most telling is that the applications for permits required by Gotion, have yet to be filed. The J.C. Penney store that was allegedly purchased by Gotion to house 200 employees, remains vacant. And according to

media. They took all the local sources, the few people they did hire have been let go. Gotion Vice-President Chuck Thelen is no longer photographed distributing checks to food banks and other community organizations in Big Rapids. His virtual press conferences, which appeared to take place in motel rooms, and where questions had to be submitted ahead of time, have stopped. And according to a source close to the event, Gotion has no plans to be at the Michigan Works! local job fair scheduled for June 10. This is a far cry from "the 2,350 good-paying jobs" promised after the deal was promoted as "the biggest ever economic development project in Northern Michigan." Of course, that was after Governor Whitmer's administration greased the skids for Gotion with \$715 million in taxpayer incentives in

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
